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**AG7971798****Corps Instruction Number Five – The RAEME Emblem****Introduction**

1. Modelled on the emblem of the British sister Corps REME, the Corps emblem is proudly displayed and worn by all RAEME soldiers and officers. The Corps emblem is depicted as the Corps Badge, is featured on the Corps flag and is displayed at units and establishments around the country and where ever RAEME soldiers are serving.

**Aim**

2. The following detail concerning the Corps Emblem is published so that any reproductions will conform to the standard pattern.

**Detail**

3. The official description of the Emblem is:

*‘Upon a lighting flash a horse forcene gorged with a coronet of four fleur-de-lis, a chain reflexed over its back and standing on a globe. Above, a crown, upon a scroll bearing the inscription - R.A.E.M.E.’*

4. The horse forcene and chain are symbolic of power under control and the lightning flash, of electrical engineering. The horse forcene also forms part of the crest of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and, together with the lightning flash, is intended to mark the close relationship which exists between the electrical and mechanical engineers in both civil and military life. The globe is indicative of the impact of engineering on the world generally.

5. The official pattern is shown in Annex A. The pdf file may be imported straight from this document. Other file types are available from the HOC Cell. The following notes are relevant:

- a. The nose of the horse will be in line with the left edge of the base of the crown.
- b. The letters ‘E.M.E.’ will always be grouped together.
- c. The globe will have the 90th Meridian vertical.
- d. The horse must always give the impression of power; the curve of the breast and belly converging with the curve of the back.
- e. The hoof supporting the horse will be to the left of the line joining the centres of the globe and the crown.
- f. The relative size of the crown may be diminished and the size of the globe increased to achieve a balance in larger reproductions
- g. The base of the crown is to be a similar diameter to the globe.

**Colours**

6. In the simplest designs, the colour scheme will be as follows:
  - a. silver for the horse and globe
  - b. gold for the crown, scroll, flash, coronet and chain
  - c. black for the outline lettering on the scroll.
7. The colours embedded in the pdf version are to be used for more elaborate designs.

**Authority for Use**

8. The RAEME emblem may be used for all Corps business and official corporate branding. The RAEME emblem may be used by allied groups, such as the RAEME Associations, with the permission of the Head of Corps. Any requests to use RAEME corporate imagery must conform to the Army Brand Manual.

**Artistic Variation**

9. Adaptations to the emblem design are not to depart from the general proportions of form. The gold/silver colour schemes in para 6 or the full colour pdf version are to be adhered to unless executed in precious metals or stone.

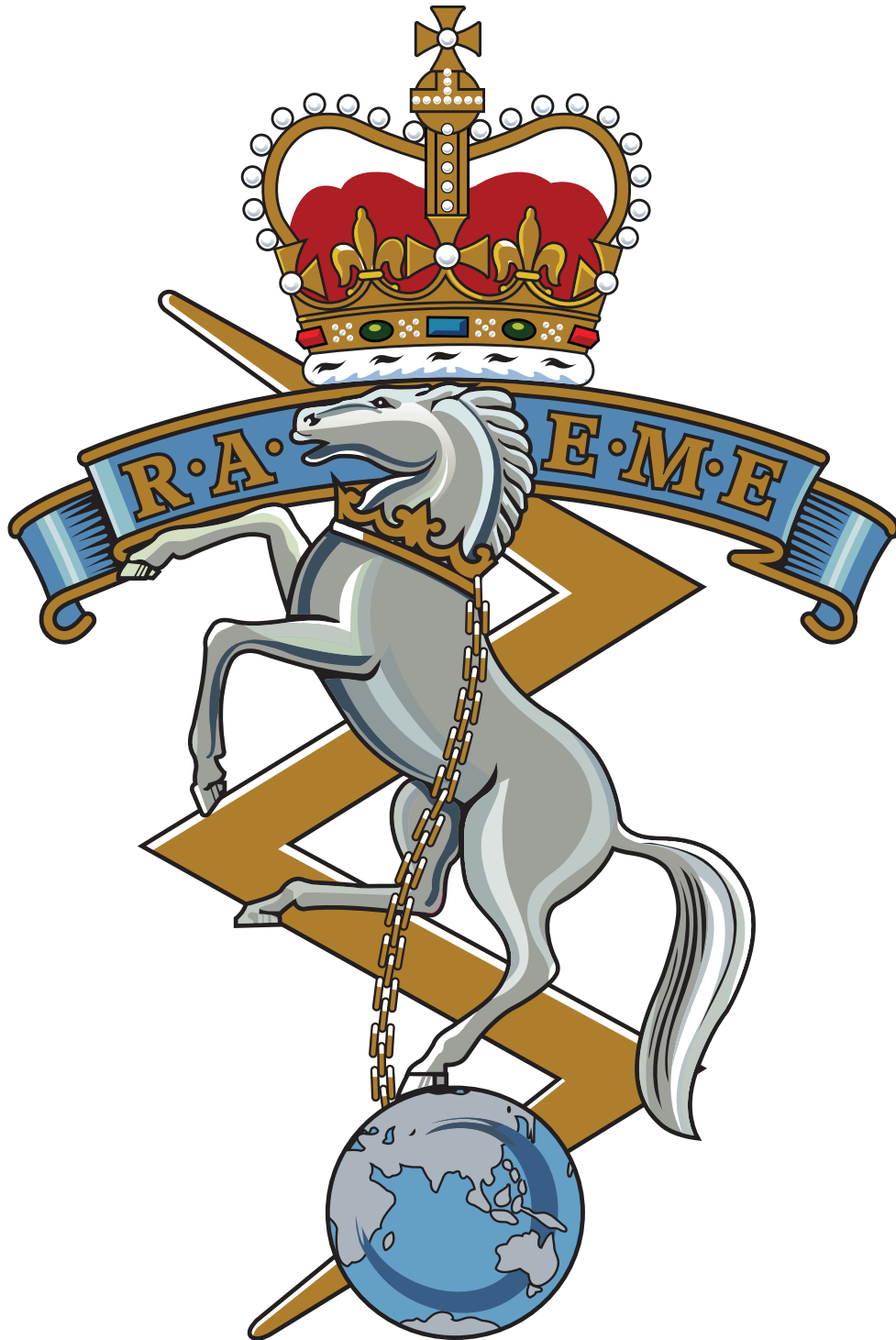


Fig 1: The RAEME Emblem - Official Pattern
